

Dick Attlesey Paces PCC Track Win

Chandler Sets Shot-put Record; Gehrman Captures Mile, 880

MADISON, Wis., June 20—Dick Attlesey, Southern California's world-record holder in the high hurdles, led the Pacific Coast Conference to its first win over the Big Ten since 1941 here tonight in Camp Randall Stadium, winning both barrier events and anchoring the winning shuttle-hurdles relay team as the coast humbled the midwesterners, 69 to 63, in the annual PCC-Big Ten trackfest.

Attlesey's times were 13.8s. and 23.2s. for the highs and lows respectively. His clocking in the 120-yard high broke the meet record of 13.9s., established by Bill Porter of Northwestern in 1948. The time in the 220-yard lows equaled Porter's stadium record, also made in 1948.

Dick anchored the PCC 480-yard shuttle hurdles team to a 15-yard triumph in 57.8s., gaining 10 yards on Minnesota's Fred Brass, the Big Ten anchor runner.

Big Margin

The lanky Trojan's margin in the tall timbers was eight yards over James Neilsen of Minnesota as he broke 14s., for the seventh time this year and scored his 23rd straight win in the high.

Attlesey won by two yards over Stanford's Bob Bryan in the short sticks and this put the meet on ice for the PCC.

With only two events remaining, the Big Ten was trailing, 57 to 61, but was favored to win the final mile relay. Attlesey and Bryan, beating out Michigan's Don Hoover in the lows, made it 69 to 58 in favor of the Coast to wrap it up.

Marks Fall

In addition to Attlesey's record-smashing high-hurdle effort, three other meet marks fell in the greatest cinderfest in Camp Randall history.

The other meet records were set by Stanford's blond giant, Otis Chandler, who threw the shot 56ft. 1 1/4 in.; Michigan's Don McEwen, who galloped the two-mile in 9m. 9.6s, and Don Gehrman, who turned in a 1m. 50.7s. 880 time after snaring the one-mile run.

Chandler's distance was the third best of his life. He did 57ft. 4 1/4 in. in copping the PCC championships this year and last week end in the NCAA tossed the shot 56ft. 1/2 in. to place second to Yale's Jim Fuchs.

Chandler's heave today exceeded Lou Davis' meet standard of 54ft. 8 1/4 in. set last year.

Gehrman Sizzles

Although the sensational Trojan timber-topper was the hero of the Coast triumph, it was an almost unbelievable triple by Wisconsin's Gehrman that really caught the fancy of the partisan gathering of more than 10,000 on a warm, windless evening.

Gehrman won the mile in 4m. 11.1s., came back to take the half in 1m. 50.7s., and made up yardage on the third leg of the mile

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relay which the Big Ten won in 3m. 15s.

In winning his 31st straight (not counting the disputed Wanamaker mile with Fred Wilt) four-lapper, Gehrman handily disposed of Troy's Jim (Super Chief) Newcomb, who had the best time in the nation at 4m. 7.7s. In fact Newcomb didn't even get second, as Ohio State's Len Truex edged up at the end to win the place position.

Troy's Super Chief, derailed by Michigan's McEwen in the NCAA two-mile last Saturday, couldn't get back on the right track when a slow pace left him vulnerable to the more potent kicks of Gehrman and Truex.

Slow Pace

Gehrman, attempting to save himself for the half mile and the mila relay, started off in the lead on a slow pace, but Paul Mello of California soon took over and got the runners around the first 440 in 62 seconds.

Mello continued to hold the lead at the half at 2m. 7s., but the Chief, realizing that he had to step it up, passed Mello on the backstretch with Gehrman right on his heels. As they passed the three-quarters mark in 3m. 14s., Newcomb was leading the Badger ace by two and a half yards.

With the fans cheering frantically, Gehrman pulled up abreast of the Chief as they came off the final turn. For a few yards they battled stride for stride, but the long-striding Wisconsin ace had too much speed and pushed to the front 40 yards from home.

Truex, who placed second in the NCAA half mile, came out of nowhere to also collar the Trojan and finished two yards back of Gehrman and one yard ahead of Newcomb at the end. Time for Truex was 4m. 11.5s., while the Chief was clocked in 4m. 12s. Gehrman's last lap was 57.8s.

Chambers Second

The Wisconsin flash's victory in the 880 broke the heart of another Trojan, Cocaptain Bob Chambers, who took second place in 1m. 51s. for the greatest performance in his career.

Chambers stuck close to a 53s. first lap, took command on the backstretch and had 15 yards on Gehrman as he went into the turn. But the Wisconsin phenom, fired by the hysterical screams of the crowd, caught the fighting Trojan 10 yards from the tape and won out by two and a half yards. At one time the winner was trailing the pack by 25 yards.

Gehrman's time was the best in the country this year and broke the old meet record of 1m. 51.4s., set by Bill Clifford of Ohio State in 1947.

Best previous time for Chambers, who won this event in 1948, was 1m. 52.3s.

The other meet record, besides those of Attlessey, Gehrman and Chandler, was set up by McEwen of Michigan, the two-mile winner in 9m. 9.6s., shattering the old standard of 9m. 12.8s., made by Michigan's Ralph Schwartzkopf in 1939.

Newcomb Second

Newcomb, recovering well from his all-out mile, was an easy second in 9m. 18.5s., as the Chief made no attempt to stay with the brilliant Wolverine. Bill Stauffer of California came through with his all-time best, 9m. 22.5s., to grab a surprise third.

Actually Newcomb wasn't supposed to run the eight-lapper. But when Coach Jesse Hill saw that the meet was getting tight near the end, he talked his ace leather-lunger into competing.

At the time Jim was fully dressed in the stands and claimed he had consumed a gallon of water since his blistering one-mile effort.

Indiana's Chuck Peters equaled the American college record for 220 yards around a turn, copping the furlong in 21.1s. Barney Ewell of Penn State originally set the mark in the 1940 NCAA.

Anderson Pulls Up

Peters got a "lift" in the 220 when Donnie Anderson of California pulled up with a muscle cramp when leading the Indianan by a yard coming off the bend. Anderson previously had won the 100 from Peters in 9.7s.

Another record almost went by the boards when Don Laz of Illinois barely missed at 15 feet on his second try after taking the pole vault at 14 ft. 3 in. Laz, who couldn't do 13 ft. in the NCAA, has an unofficial indoor mark of 15 ft. but has never done it competitively.

Twelve Trojans will take off

tomorrow for Chicago where they will join the Los Angeles Athletic Club, which will be gunning for the team title in the national senior AAU championships at College Park, Md., this Saturday.
