U. and Cimason Tie for Third in Great Meet.

DEVER, Colo., May 11.—Except the fact that Utah athletes show brilliancy above the masses, the annual Rocky mountains conference track and field championships this afternoon was brought back from its roots in the western division. Colorado Aggies, getting every possible break in the meet, accumulated a total of 24 points to win. But the three Utah schools captured the next three places. Utah A. C. was second with 20 points and Utah university and Brigham Young university tied for third at 17 each.

Four records were shattered and one equaled by the athletes. When Virgil Albert of Denver paced the century to 1:17.1, it was generally agreed that, regardless of the outcome of the shot put and hammer, his performance would eclipse all others. But it remained for Jackie Burton of Utah to outshine even the brilliant Albert.

Burton Breaks His Time Without Effort.

Burton surprised the multitude by outstriking his teammates, Nate Long, and the B. T. U. runners, to capture the 440 in the accidental time of 1:11. But he turned around shortly thereafter and dashed off the half-mile in the record-breaking time of 1:11.5. Jensen, who had pressed him in previous races, was lost in the rear, and the handsome crowd, regarding Burton just straddled to the tape as if he had made no serious effort to break his own time.

The quarter-mile and the century were the feature races of the day. B. T. U. had been expected heavily in the 400, but when Burton and Long met one another they could pick up only second with Collins and fourth with Miller. Long was certain great stuff, leading into the stretch for the final drive, but he was not strong enough for the great pace set by Burton. Jackie, who coasted home, patted Long all the way, and, with his victory assured, said over his shoulder: "Come on, Nate; come on."

An analysis of the meet shows that Utah would have won but for Grant's misfortune in the preliminary and Pilling's failure in the javelin. Grant strayed a lightness in the high jump and failed in quality, but he did pick up 2 points in the high hurdles. Pilling did not even place in the javelin. Smith and Phillips of Utah Aggies were first and second, although the winning throw was 107 feet 3 inches. Long did not receive from his quarter-mile race in time for the 100, and was forced to be content with a 17th.

Utah Aggies did not figure to appear as champions, but acquitted themselves well by taking second and 10 points. Marvin Burke was his usual 20 points in the distance, equaling his mile record of 4:11.5. In addition, Hawley picked up 1 in the shot, and Worthington fulfilled predictions by winning the high hurdles and running second to Burke in the low hurdles.

Utah university triumphantly pushed the Brigham Young athletes out of line by their brilliant work in the middle distance. Jensen and Miller were no match for Burton and Long, while B. Jensen and Bentley failed to deliver. Long was as snappy as ever, winning the 100 and 200 low hurdles with his customary ease and finishing second in the 100.

Lawson and Russell picked up points in the weight events, but Utah surprised by winning the relay, an event that had been considered B. T. U.

Albert of Denver Runs Great Race.

Besides the 20 points won by Burton and the 1 in the relays, Utah captured 1 points in the high jump with Jensen, two in the 440 with Long, 1 in the high hurdles with Grant, 1 in the broad jump with Jensen, 1 in the half-mile with Briggs and 1 in the five-mile with Berry.

On his last hour, Clark of Denver shattered the hammer record by leading the sphere 145 feet 7 inches. Up until that time, Beattie was an easy winner. In the shot put, Beattie made a new record in the preliminary of 41 feet 1-1-1 inches, which stood.

Albert ran a marvelous race in the 100, slipping off 1-18 of a second from the record. Long forced Albert all the way, and it was only in the last five yards that the B. T. U. flash went to the front. He was checked by four runners in 1:17.1.

In an exhibition race, Hagman of Denver, who is thought to, dashed off the 100 yards in 17 1-4 seconds. In slip 1-18 of second off his world record for the distance. The original record of 17 1-4 cents was set in Salt Lake by Charles Peabody.
