Cougars Win Conference Laurels In Thrilling Meet; Utah Second; Owen Rowe Scores 18 Points For High Honors.

"U STADIUM, SALT LAKE CITY, May 25—Scoring points in all but three events, Coach Ott Romney's B. Y. U. Cougars won their first Rocky Mountain conference track championship this afternoon. Led by the great Owen Rowe, who chalked up 18 points on the occasion of his last college meet, the Cougars totaled 48.5 counters, just 2 more than Utah 'U.' The Redskins finished well ahead of the favored Colorado 'U' outfit, which placed third with 40 points.

Colorado Aggies, with a strong array of field men, took fourth with 32. The remainder of the schools entered never had a title chance, although all scored points.

A chilling wind, which at times was near the proportions of a gale, made record-breaking marks impossible. However, some excellent performances were in evidence.

The meet saw the shattering of just two records—both of which were achieved in Friday's preliminary. Walt Clark of Denver, who paced the hammer 262.7 feet, and Dan Beattie of Colorado Aggies with a 57 ft. 1 1/2 in. heave of the shot, were the top record-breaking athletes.

Rowe Is High Man—

Owen Rowe closed his college track career in a blaze of glory and carried off high point honors after a great individual duel with Buck Grant of Utah. Rowe won the 200-yard dash and the 220-yard low hurdles with ease, captured the 200-yard dash after a fierce battle with White of Colorado 'U,' and placed third in the broad jump. Grant took first in the broad jump and the high hurdles, tied for with Chandler of Colorado Teachers for first in the high jump, and placed third in the low hurdles to garner 17 1/2 points. Grant's broad jump mark of 22 ft. 1 1/2 in., made Frisky, without an onslaught, and was only one-half inch from Rowe's conference record, made in last year's state meet.

The absence of Nate Long, star sprinter and 440 man, was keenly felt by Utah. The Redskins showed unexpected strength in a number of events, to give the 'U' a terrific battle for first honors. Long was placed on the 'U' mile relay team despite his illness, as a last desperate effort, but it was unavailing, Utah being forced to be content with third place in this event.

George Corbett of the 'U' proved a Cougar hero by taking an unexpected first place in the discus, defeating the great Dan Beattie of C. A. C. with a heave of 142 feet—close to Beattie's conference mark. This, coupled with Beattie's third place in the discus, proved the turning point of the meet, giving the Cougars a lead which they never relinquished.

Wright Shows Class—

Lee Wright did great work in the middle distances. He won the 800-yard run, one of the prettiest races of the day; took fourth in the 400 after a great duel with Myers of Utah Aggies for third position; and ran an excellent race as anchor man in the mile relay.

The 'U' points were scored as follows: Rowe, 18 (first in 200, 220, and low hurdles); Grant, 15 (broad jump); Wright, 7 (first in 400, fourth in 800); Corbett, 5 (first in discus); Beattie, 3 (third in discus, fourth in hammer); Beattie, 1 (fourth in mile, fourth in two-mile); Dunsen, 1 (third in shot); Staples, 1 1/2 (first for third in pole vault); Rasmussen, 1 (third in 200); Nelson, 1 (fifth in two-mile); mile relay team of Probert, Elgert, Jansz, and Wright, 2 points for fourth place.

B. Y. U. garnered five first places, while Utah took four and a tie for one more first position.

Takes Posture 20—

The heaviest races were the 800, two-mile and 20—in the half-mile event, Wright of the 'U' was by far better for a considerable portion of the race, while Thomas of Denver 'U' set a killing pace. People of Utah passed Thomas with about 100 yards to go and on the home stretch Wright captured it with handsy, Thomas pulling the heavy four teams to take second.

In the 20, White of Colorado 'U' gave Rowe of the 'U' a terrific

STOP SIGNALS IN OPERATION

All Vehicles and Pedestrians Must Observe Semaphore Signal Lights.

Utah's new semaphore stop signal went into effect on University avenue and Center street Saturday forenoon and is operating on a 30 second interval with a caution signal of four seconds.

With the installation of the new system new traffic rules must be adopted, according to announcement of Chief of Police Otto Dirk. The appearance of the red light is a signal to stop before reaching the sidewalk line. This applies to all types of vehicles, including the bicycle, Chief Dirk declares. When the red light is on no vehicle should enter the intersection irrespective of whether it is the intention of the driver to turn either to the right or to the left, or to go straight ahead. No vehicle should start over the sidewalk line until the green light appears, thus giving time by pedestrians to clear the passage during the four seconds that the yellow light is on.

No U turns will be permitted at the Mountain intersection, the officer explains. This, however, is the only intersection where the U turn is not permitted. The U turn may also be made in the center of blocks where the turning buttons appear.

With this warning to the operators of vehicles, Chief Dirk also desires to emphasize the responsibilities of the pedestrians. They, too, must move with the light signals. When the red light is on it is the signal for the pedestrian to advance. He, however, will be subject to prosecution if he attempts to cross the street while the green light is on on the side of the intersection he proposes to cross.

While most drivers have already become accustomed to cutting the corner short, there are yet a few persons who go around the corners. The officer expresses the hope that this practice will be discarded.

battle until about 20 yards from the finish, when Rowe pulled away to triumph. Haynes, Denver U star, and R. M. C. record-holder, collapsed in this race and had to be carried from the track.

The two-mile found Ivie of Utah, leading most of the way, with the husky DeVries of Montana State close behind him. On the last 220 yards, Parker, Colorado College, started a terrific sprint from fourth place, which carried him past Bentley and DeVries, and he was close behind Ivie at the tape.

Jack Squires of Utah ran a beautiful mile race in 4:27.5, leading all the way, while Pinkney of Colorado U showed class to take the 440 despite a last minute bid from Schissler of C. C. The Boulder mile relay team was far ahead at all times.
