## Colorado Bags 942-3 Points For Record

Utah Second With 47 5-6; Cruter Soars 6 Ft. 81/4 In.

Colorado university's brilliant
band of Buffaloes shattered all
scoring feeords in the Mountain
States track and field championships Saturday as they avalanched
their way to the third straight major sports title by amassing the
unheard-of total of 94 2-3 points.

One-Team Affair

Before the Bisons went on their rampage in the "U" stadium Saturday, the biggest score-ever turned in at a conference meet was 73 points, made by Utah in 1981. But Coach Frank Potts' aggregation made that score look weak by comparison as it turned the conference track show almost into a one-team affair.

Utah university placed second with just half the points scored by C. U., 47 5-6. Denver placed third with 26 2-S. Utah Aggies finished fourth with 24%, just half a point in front of Colorado State college. B. Y. U. was sixth with 22 1-3, while the Woming Cowboys were unable to gather in a single point.

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Colorado's victory march was paced by Dick Kearns, Kansas relays decathlon champion, who captured high individual honors, and Dick Cruter, the bespectacled negro, who set up only conference record of the day.

Cruter floated over the crossbar at 6 feet 8% inches to better his own record of 6 feet 3% inches, established last year. After that, he lanky negro attempted to set a world's record at 6 feet 10 inches, but he failed. Nevertheless, the crowd was freated to one of the greatest high jumping performances ever exhibited in the country. The world record is 6 feet 9% inches, just an inch and a half away from the Boulder star's record jump. Cruter cleared the bar by more than this distance on his beyonce than this distance on his beyonce than this distance on his her which hampered all the performers, Cruter's leap Saturday was indeed amazing.

13 Points for Kearns

Kearns flashed through to victories in both the high and the low hurdles and tied for second in the pole vault to garner 13 counters and bag the individual crown. A stiff headwind made his efforts for a record in the highs impossible. Dick tied his old mark of 1.4.5 in the preliminaries Friday. The C. U. ace was pushed all the way by Paul Cope, sensational Colorado sophomore, who will step right into Kearns' shoes next year. The two were in a class by themselves. Dave Sudduth of Colorado State, a stocky young powerhouse who does his best running when the weather is raw led the speedy field to the tape in the 100 in a blanket finish. Clyde Crosby and Miller of C. U. were next, nosing out the D. U. pair, Wright and Bratton. Sudduth also took second in the furlong, pushing Clyde Crosby to the tape. Bratton and Wright were next. Lee Cardon took a fifth and was the only Utah sprinter to place. 13 Points for Ke

The Coloradoans walked off with eight of the 16 firsts and scored heavily in every event with the exception of the javelin. That was the only event that the Bisns did not get at least a third place.

the half-mile. The plucky little Utah Aggie runner went out from the start to win the race and set

John Phillips of Colorado pushed him hard at the finish, but the Logan trackster held on to cross the line with one of the Utah Aggies' two firsts. Bill Bennett of the A. C. uncorked a righty toss on his last attempt which gave him the shotput honors after he had trailed in fourth place during most of the meet.

Dick Bennion of Utah retained his conference broad-jumping crown by leaping 22 feet 10 3-8 inches while Clarence Gehrke, Utah sophomore, who tied up the javelin points with a 200-foot heave in the preliminaries, got the wand out 201,7 feet to better his previous mark.

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Eddie Hart of Utah won a brilliant mile duel from Hobbs, another outstanding sophomore from C. U. The two put on a sprint finish that looked like the finish of a quarter-mile instead of the four-lap event.

Ferd Dreher of Denver got the discus out 148.15 feet to win the Olympic platter event.
Verl Wilde, Utah's original hard-

luck kid, finally got into shape and vaulted himself into the conference championship Saturday with a leap of 13 feet 3 inches. The mark was just half an inch from the confer-ence record.

Dallas Christensen, who has "run about 700 miles," to put it in the words of Mentor Ike Armstrong, finally came through to win his letter after three years of patient and persistent campaigning. Dallas took fifth in the two-mile. No trackman was ever more deserving of his letter.

The time in most of the races was slower than in the preliminaries, due to the strong headwind. Rain threatened throughout the meet, but gra-ciously held off until the events were completed.

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
