# **Buffs Amass** 86 Points To Triumph

## **Cougars Place** Second, **Utes in Third**

track and field machine smashed through the "U" stadium to its third consecutive Big Seven conference championship Saturday by amassing a total of 86 points and completing its grand slam of sports championships in the Mountain

States circuit. Coach Frank Potts' shirted Buffaloes grabbed six firsts and scored in every event but the javelin in adding the final touch

the 1939-40 sports campaign. Brigham Young university scored 56 points to gain undisputed second place and close a very successful season, while the Utes edged out

season, while the Utes edged out Colorado State in a hectic scrap for third place. Utah scored 36 points against 34 for the Colorado Aggies. Utah Aggies registered 16, Denver 10 and Wyoming 2.

Four records were shattered and one tied in the brilliant track and field spectacle as the grand crew of collegians made the most of the fast track and the perfect weather to make history. to make history. Captain Clarence Gehrke of Utah wafted out the javelin 212.6 feet to start the record-shattering. Dick Cope of Colerado got the spirit

and flashed over the high hurdles in :14.4; Mac Speedie followed suit with his greatest low hurdle at-

with his greatest low hurdle attempt, covering the low sticks in :23.2, and Cy Ellsworth completed the day's record smashing with two spectacular sprints.

Cy first covered the 100-yard dash in :09.6 seconds to the the old mark and later he swept through the furlong in :20.7 to cut the oldest record on the books by the oldest record on the books by one-tenth of a second. But the officials ruled that the mark could not be accepted because there was a 5.3-mile wind blowing from the southwest. A wind allowance of three miles or less would have assured him the record.

The old records broken were: Gehrke's own 208.76-foot javelin heave; the :14.5 high hurdle mark (Continued on Page 2-C)

held jointly by Cope and Dick Kearns, both of C. U.; Dale Scho-field's old low hurdle mark of 22.3.3, made in 1936. The 220-yard dash record was set by Ed Haynes, present Denver coach, in 1927, at :20.8. Powers of Denver set the 100-yard dash mark in 1933 at :09.6. 100-yard dash mark in 1933 at 109.6.

Gehrke 'Way Ahead ' Gehrke was 25 feet in front of his nearest competitor in the javelin. Speedie pushed Cope to the high hurdle record and equaled the old mark himself. Speedie had a comfortable lead in the low hurdles. Ellsworth was crowded to the tape by Fred Powers of Denveryin the 100 but won the 220 by several yards.

High point honors for the day went to Bob Thackeray of Colorado State. The mild-mannered and modest Thackeray won the high jump with a leap of 6 feet 3 inches, the broad jump at 23 feet 7½ inches, and placed second in the 220-yard dash and third in the 100. He scored just half his team's total. Bob is a junior and has one more year of competition.

Loren Creese won the shot on his trial heave of Friday, which carried 50 feet 4 inches. Thackeray's broad jump was also made in the trials.

Oscar Jacobsen of Colorado won the greatequarter-mile battle and :09.6.

Oscar Jacobsen of Colorado won the great-quarter-mile battle and Dale Nelson of Utah State put on a sensational finish to beat out the game little Lee Brooks for second place. It was one of the best finishes of the day.

Dale Bristol of Colorado set up a blistering pace in the half-mile for the first lap and a half, but he started to tie up on the last 220 yards and Henry Bourne captured his second straight conference 880-yard title with a powerfulf finish. Boyd Stansfield of Utah overtook the weakening Bristol about ten yards from the tape to give the Indians a second place. Ray Jenkins, Colorado husky fullback, bettered his toss in the trials to go up to 152.55 and win the Olympic platter event. Pershing Blake of Colorado State, last year's winner, was second.

Carl Clark won the pole vault handily but failed on his three attempts to go 14 feet 3 inches. He field in the event.

Dick Heiderstadt of Colorado gave the Buffs another first by winning the two-mile run in good time. Bus Webb of B. Y. U. made a game try but could not quite match the stride of his lanky rival. To close the meet, Brigham Young won the mile relay, with a determined finish to edge out Jacobson, who had beaten him in the quarter, by several yards.

The victory adds the track title to the conference football and basketball honors already won by the Buffaloes, not to mention their eastern division, swimming, wrestling, tennis, golf and baseball titles. If there had been any more sports, Colorado would have won them. There is no question that Colorado is athletic king in the Big Seven circuit.
