

PLACE IN FINAL EVENT NOSES OUT VIRGINIA

Tar Heels Win by One Point in Southern Conference Championships.

TIN CAN, CHAPEL HILL, March 10.—(AP) —By placing in the thrilling one-mile relay, the closing event of the fifth annual indoor track games of the Southern Conference, the University of North Carolina tonight won the team championship.

Virginia led the Tar Heels by one point as the relay was called, but the Cavaliers failed to place in the event. Virginia placed second in team scoring.

TEAM SCORES.

Team leaders were: North Carolina 31.6; Virginia 17.5; Maryland 17; Duke 16.4; V. M. I., 14.6; Washington and Lee 8.2; South Carolina 7, and V. P. I., 5.5.

Duke won the freshman division with 29 points, North Carolina scoring 12; William and Mary 7; Washington and Lee 6, and Georgetown 5.

In the scholastic ranks Atlanta Boys' high was first with 17 points; Newark Prep, defending champion, had nine; Woodberry Forest seven, and Morristown, Tenn., high, six.

Catholic University led the non-conference division with 13 points; Davidson was second with 10; William and Mary, third, with nine; Georgetown, fourth, with 7; and Richmond, fifth, with four.

Approximately 115 competitors representing 44 teams from Newark, N. J., to Atlanta took part in the four divisions to get new records.

RECORDS FALL.

Six records were broken and three were tied.

A crowd of more than 2,000 saw the games. Governor Ethingham of North Carolina was honorary referee and awarded the conference trophies, won last year by Duke, to the Tar Heels.

Arnold, bespectacled and slim Atlanta youth jumping for Boys' High of Atlanta, set the meet's first new record by going six feet in the scholastic high jump. His mark equalled the conference record. Navis of Georgetown then set a new freshman high jump mark at five feet, 11 3/8 inches.

Stevens of Boys' high joined Arnold among the record breakers by sprinting the scholastic 60-yard dash in 8.3 seconds, shaving one-tenth second off the record set jointly by Gains of Woodberry Forest and Ward of Boys High.

McRAE SETS MARK

In the conference division, Edwin McKee, co-captain of North Carolina's team, ran a beautiful race and lapped two entrants in setting a new mile time of 4 minutes, 24.5 seconds. Lack of Virginia had held the mark at 4 minutes, 24.4 seconds.

In quick order Evans of Davidson, in the non-conference 60-yard dash, and Widmeyer of Maryland, in the conference division of the same event, tied old records. Evans stopped the distance in 6.6 seconds to tie the old record of Feagle of Davidson and Smithers of William and Mary while Widmeyer equalled his own record of 6.3 seconds, set last year.

Everett of Virginia cleared the high hurdles in the conference 75-yard event in 5.7 seconds, to cut two-tenths off the mark of Finkelstein of Washington and Lee, set in 1932.
