

Lach Sets New Shot Put Mark

Duke Gridder Breaks Record On Last Throw

CHAPEL HILL, Feb. 28.—(AP)—North Carolina's Tar Heels tonight won their fourth consecutive Southern conference indoor track title by swamping 12 other clubs in one of the most one-sided meets in the history of the indoor games here.

The fleet Tar Heels scored 54 points, to annex their ninth championship since the games were inaugurated in 1930.

Duke was second, with 22 points, and Maryland third with 16. Last year the teams also finished in that order.

More than 400 athletes from 41 schools and colleges participated in this four-division circus here.

Other conference scorers, in order, were Richmond, eight and a half; Davidson, eight; V.M.I., seven and a half; Clemson, seven; Virginia Tech, five; South Carolina, two, and N. C. State, 1.

Navy, the non-conference title-holder, won its division with 35½ points. Virginia was second with 29. Catholic university with 11; Tennessee with 10 and Catawba with one-half were the other point-scorers.

JEFFERSON HIGH POCKETS SCHOLASTIC

Jefferson high, of Roanoke, Va., clinched victory in the scholastic division by nabbing the mile relay and boosting its total points to 13. Newport News (Va.) high was second with eight and Central high, of Washington, and Eastern high, of Washington, were tied for third with seven each. Other scorers were Salisbury high, five; Durham high, three; Thomas Jefferson high, of Richmond, Va., three; Episcopal high, of Alexandria, Va., three; Reynolds high, of Winston-Salem, two; Hampton (Va.) high, two; Central high, of Charlotte, one; Rocky Mount high, one.

Duke won the freshman division, with 17 points, by taking the final event—the one-mile relay. Virginia was second with 14 and North Carolina third with 13. Other scorers were Richmond, three; Presbyterian, three; Washington and Lee, two; Catholic university, two, and Loyola, of Baltimore 1.

Three new records for the meet were set. Werner Brown, Duke's great quarter-miler, covered the distance in 50.9 seconds, clipping a tenth of a second off the conference mark set in 1939 by Miller, of Maryland.

Julian McKenzie, Salisbury (N. C.) high school boy, ran the 1,000 yard race in 2:22.6, breaking the record set in 1934 by Holt, of Morristown, by three-tenths of a second.

Steve Lach, Duke's star football player, broke the conference shot record on his very last throw, with a toss of 47 feet six one half inches. Lach held the old record of 46 feet 11½ inches, set last year.

Bobby Cifera, of Tennessee, grid-iron ace, copped the non-conference shot put event with a toss of 46 feet 9½ inches. Romine, of Tennessee, was second. Runner-up to Lach in the conference shot was Griffin, of Richmond.

Duke Alexander, another football player, sewed up five points for Maryland by winning the conference high jump. Alexander, who holds the records in the freshman and scholastic divisions, competed for the first time in the varsity frame. His best jump today, of five feet, 11¼ inches, was good enough to win but was far below the mark of six-four which he set as a student in West Nottingham academy.
