

Two Coast Marks In Relays Smashed By Meet Winners

Cardinals Run Up Big Lead Over Nearest Rival, L. A. Athletic Club; Team Clips Almost Second Off Pacific Mark For 880; Fresno Boy Proves Marvel

GATHERING 58½ points and smashing two Pacific Coast Relay records and equalling another record in the 120 high hurdles, Stanford University's stars of the track and field romped to an easy but impressive victory over other major universities here yesterday afternoon. Nearly 5,000 persons watched the meet, Raisin Day's afternoon entertainment feature, which was successful from the standpoint of performance but disappointing in point of attendance.

The Stanford stars finished 33½

The Stanford stars finished 23½ points ahead of the Los Angeles Athletic Club, which placed second; Hollywood Athletic Club was third with 12; University of Southern California fourth, 21; Olympic Club, fifth, 18½ points; University of California, sixth, 1.

A perfect day and a lightning-like track and steady field helped the athletes, some 300 in number, representing about two score institutions in three classes of competition, make record time in several events and near record time in others, as the athletes launched their attack on the marks.

Fresno High Gets Awards

California Institute of Technology, Los Angeles, won major honors in Class C, with 30 points, while Fresno High School carried off the lion's share of awards in Class C with 21 points.

While Stanford's fast relay team stood out as the sensation of the meet, Biff Hoffman, star Cardinal weight man, was the high point man in Class A, taking ten points by placing first in the discus and shotput, winning over Bud Houser, famed University of Southern California weight man. East of Olympic Club was second high point man with seven, and Houser third, with six.

Bob King, star Stanford University high jumper, was unable to take part in the meet because of an examination, as were a few other stars from other universities.

Coast Relay Record Smashed

Stanford's relay team, Bob Syer, Larry Babcock, Emerson Spencer and Jack Dales skirted the track in 1:28½ to set up a new Pacific Coast record in the 330-yard relay. The fast-stepping team smashed the record of 1:29 2-5 a few minutes after the relay team of the California Institute of Technology, Los Angeles, had tied the record in class B competition.

As a climax to the meet, the Stanford runners staged a pretty race to win the two-mile relay and set a new Pacific Coast record of 8 minutes, 4.4 seconds. The former record was set in the Washington relays and was 8 minutes, 10 seconds.

Spencer raced the last lap in the two-mile relay and established such a lead as he went into the final lap that he had no competition at the finish. He was pressed hard at the finish in the 330-yard relay.

Hurdle Record Equalled

Stanford gathered more glory in the 120-yard high hurdles when Nichols of the Redshirts took the sticks in 14.6 seconds, equaling the Pacific Coast record held by Dye of the Hollywood Athletic Club.

Other marks fell in event in class C, arranged for San Joaquin Valley High School. Brouse of Corcoran, nephew of Bud House, University of Southern California weight star, tossed the shot 47 feet, 11½ inches. The valley record was 47 feet, 4 inches.

Kennedy of Fresno High School, broad jumped 21 feet, 9½ inches to topple the valley broad jump mark of 21 feet, 7 inches.

Barnes Wins Pole Vault

One of the most thrilling events from the spectators' view point was the pole vault in class C, which was won by Lee Barnes, U. S. C. holder of the Pacific Coast record of 12

feet 8 inches. Barnes scored 13 feet 4 1/2 inches, but he couldn't go any higher because of the size of the standards. Barnes was having a good day and was expected to go higher than he did. He was pushed hard by Edwards of Stanford, who placed second with a result of 11 feet 2 inches.

Modesto Junior College placed second in class B with 22 points; San Jose, third, with 11; San Diego, fourth, 10; Fresno State, fifth, 17 1/2; U. C. at Los Angeles, sixth, 14; College of Pacific, seventh, 13; Pasadena Junior College, eighth, 11 1/2; Nevada, ninth, 7.

Stokes High Point Man

Stokes of Pasadena was high-point man in this division with eight points. Schultz of California Tech was second with 7 1/2 points and Hawley of San Jose and Carpenter of Pacific tied for third with 7 points.

Schultz gave the spectators a real thrill in one of the first events on the program when he won the 100 in the best time of 8:14. This mark was even better than the class A 100-yard mark, which was 10 flat. Schultz is captain of the California Tech team.

The only other near record-breaking performance in the class B section came in the 100-yard relay, when the California Tech team, composed of Meuser, Flynn, Darling and Schultz, tied the Pacific Coast mark of 1:24.4.

Kester Takes High Hurdles

Kester of Fresno was his wrier match when he took the 100-yard high hurdles in 9:14.4.

California Tech's crack relay team won the mile relay in 2:17.4.

In the field events no records were shattered, but several stars broke their own previous marks. Frane of Fresno was the javelin with a throw of 130 feet 2 inches.

Crooks of Pacific won the discus with a throw of 128 feet.

In the high jump, Kaefer of the University of California went almost as high as the class A jumpers when he took the bar at 4 feet 2 inches. Russell of Fresno broke all his own previous marks to take second place at 4 feet, 1 inch.

Stokes of the Pasadena Junior College took the broad jump with a leap of 22 feet 4 1/2 inches. Wilhelmsen of Fresno got a fourth.

Kennedy Wins Blood Jump

Kennedy of Fresno performed as predicted and lengthened the valley blood jump record. David Brann was close on Kennedy's heels. The Tech jumper tied the valley mark of 11 feet 7 inches just before Kennedy made his record-breaking jump. Brann was unable, however, to increase his former mark.

The play was a thrilling race from start to finish. Smith, Fresno High sprinter, proved the star of the race, overcoming a thirty-yard lead on the last lap to place first.

Jackson of Fresno High and Lowe of Visalia finished almost neck and neck in the country dash. Jackson showed his usual last-strand spurt but was beaten out at the tape by Lowe. Jackson injured his ankle in the race, and so was unable to compete in the relay. The injury will not be serious enough to keep him out of the state meet.

Phlips of Lodi High School carried off individual honors in the 70 high school class, taking seven points, five in the high jump and two in the broad jump. Becher of Stanford was second with six.

Porterville finished second to Fresno High School with eighteen points; Hanford, third, twelve points; Tulare, fourth, ten points; Fresno Tech, fifth, eight; Hanford, sixth, seven; and Visalia tied for sixth, with seven points each.

Following the final events, the crowd watched Queen Blanche and King Monte Blue of the festival, accompanied by King Monte Blue of the festival, and Al C. Fox, president of the District festival association, present silver loving cups to the high point men in the respective classes, and cups to the captains of the teams capturing the major honors in each division.

Queen Blanche and King Monte Blue came from the stands at the call of Chief Announcer Edgar Davis of Stanford. Davis made a big hit with the crowd and kept the fans in good spirits from the start with his humorous line of chatter.

"Blanche is supposed to be sentimental, but make yourself useful as well," Davis told the royal pair as they stepped up to award the trophies.

First place winners in all events were awarded wrist watches, second place winners medals, and third place winners ribbons. No award, except one point, went to third place.
