

TROJAN LEADER SHATTERS MARK

*Cleers 14ft. 1 3-4in. for New
Pole Vault Record*

*Kuck Tosses Shot 51ft. 1-2in.
to Top Rose's Mark*

*Charley Borah Runs Century
in 9 3-5s.*

FRESNO, April 28. (P) — Two world's records, one of which has withstood nineteen years of battering and one which was established 3000 miles from here just a few months ago, went into the discard today in the Fresno State College stadium to burn the name of the West Coast relays into the history of track-and-field competition.

Ending for the moment a long-distance race with Sabin Carr of Yale, Capt. Lee Barnes, doughty little pole vaulter from the University of California, soared over the pole-vault standard at the unheard of height of 14ft. 1 3-4in., to better by a half-inch the world's record established by Carr last winter. Despite the fact that Barnes cleared the bar with plenty of room to spare, it is doubtful whether his mark will receive official recognition. A breeze blowing during the entire afternoon swept directly across the pole-vault pits.

A second world's mark, which probably will be recognized, was established by Johnny Kuck, former Kansas state teacher weight man competing this year for the Los Angeles Athletic Club when he tossed the sixteen-pound shot 51ft. 1-2in., bettering by half an inch the mark set in 1903 by Ralph Rose of the Olympic Club.

A third world's record was equaled by Charley Borah, University of Southern California's successor to Charley Paddock, when he stepped a gallant finish in the 100-yard dash to win over Russell Sweet of the Olympic Club and Weldon Draper, a team-mate, in 9.6s. Borah's mark ties that established by D. J. Kelley of Oregon in 1921, and recognized by the Amateur Athletic Union as the fastest 100 yards ever traveled by a human being.

Fifteen West Coast relay marks, including one Pacific Coast intercollegiate record, fell before the assault of more than 400 athletes, as Southern California carried off major honors in Class A with 68 points. Stanford, the favorite, and the outstanding dual meet performer on the Coast, trailed 2 points behind, tying with the Los Angeles Athletic Club for second place with 46 points. The Olympic Club was third with 27 points. University of California and University of California at Los Angeles contenders failed to register a point in the entire meet.

The favorite pulled through in Class B as Occidental College tallied 28 points to win by a substantial margin. Other colleges and junior colleges competing in this class finished in the scoring column as follows: Modesto, 19 1/2; San Diego, 16; Santa Ana, 16; Fresno State, 15 1/2; San Jose, 12; Riverside, 11; Pasadena, 11; College of the Pacific, 8 1/2; Compton, 5; Whittier, 4, and Nevada, 4.

Bakersfield High School lead Class C competitors with 25 points, leading: Kingsburg, 15; Taft, 14; Fresno, 13; Tulare, 12; Hanford, 11; Fresno Tech, 8; Coalinga, 8; Parker, 5; Visalia, 4 1/2; Merced, 4; Turlock, 4; Porterville, 4; Madera, 3, and Selma, 1 1/2.
